It is with deep sadness that we announce the passing of the Merion Civic Association's President, Margot Flaks, on Monday April 14, 2008.

Margot played an active role as a Director in the Merion Civic Association for over 20 years, and prior to becoming President of the organization, served as head of the Social Committee as well as the chair of the History Committee. At the

beginning of her tenure as President, Margot set a number of goals for herself, the Association and the community. In her almost two years in office as president of the Association she managed to accomplish a majority of these. Margot saw the need to increase the number of active Directors on the Board, and even opened her home for a reception for prospective nominees. As a result, we are now fortunate to have several new directors for the Association. She also understood the importance of Merion residents becoming more actively involved in the Community Watch program, and now, we have a representative to this organization and a number of new community volunteers. Margot, being a forward thinking individual, recognized the value of the establishment of a Merion Civic website, and oversaw its development and creation. She also worked tirelessly with the Friends of the Barnes, hoping to keep the Barnes Foundation in what she fervently considered to be its rightful home, Merion.

Margot may be best remembered by the community as a co-creator and leader (with Rolf Charleston) of the Merion Walks. She knew the history of Merion as well as any person in our community and had plans to investigate having several houses in Merion historically registered. She delved continuously into the past of this rich and fascinating neighborhood in which we live, and thoroughly enjoyed sharing this knowledge with others.



Flag Day Concert



Commissioner's Report

I would like to begin my Commissioner's Report by honoring the memory of Merion Civic Association's President, Margot Flaks. Margot was a caring and thoughtful community leader who possessed immense intelligence and energy. She was an effective spokesperson working to retain the Barnes Foundation in Merion. Her eloquent advocacy at Township meetings

helped to secure unanimous passage of the 2006 Township Barnes resolution as well as the 2007 ordinance change, (which set the stage for the County petition to retain the Foundation in Merion), in light of new financial circumstances. I cannot think of Margot without remembering her frequent and engaging smile which was a reflection of all of her wonderful qualities. I am saddened with her passing, and I will miss Margot, as will so many others whose lives she also touched.

In news around Merion, St. Josephs' University's acquisition of Episcopal Academy proceeds through Lower Merion Township land development in anticipation of their August closing date. St. Joseph's has proven itself to be an excellent neighbor, and its annex of the Episcopal Academy campus promises to retain the beauty of this part of our neighborhood. We credit St. Joseph's with positive changes during the past two years. For example, St. Joseph's bought and closed down the Muddy Duck, which became a nuisance bar to surrounding neighbors. St. Joseph's also mitigated incompatible uses between Sullivan Hall and Latch's Lane Condominiums and paid for a long fence abutting The Condos. Additionally, St. Joseph's constructed a large multi-use parking facility at 54th and City Avenue to absorb the parking demands of a growing campus.

Their land development application involves no new buildings and the demolition of two garages and a squash court. The application will also involve converting a soccer field into a college baseball field and converting other fields into intramural playing areas. St. Joseph's has met with Merion Civic Association, the Latch's Lane Neighbors, the York Lynn Manor Condominium Association, and Lower Merion Township staff. In doing so, there has been a healthy dialogue with joint problem solving. St. Joseph's has made the following commitments: to deal with storm water and traffic, to not light its playing fields at night, to erect a net to contain home run baseballs, and to provide necessary visual and auditory buffers for homes on Berwick and Raynham Road by exploring a public address system with speakers in or near the bleachers instead of blasting sound from a traditional elevated sound system. Conversation with Township staff have addressed environmental issues including storm water management, opening a new inlet to the City Avenue sewer system, the retention of mature trees, bio-filters in parking areas, and planting trees between the fields to provide the visual and auditory buffers to near neighbors.




Landmark Tour Explores Merion

While her cooking was always exquisite, it was also indicative of her generosity and community spirit. Attendees of the Associations Annual Meeting always eagerly anticipated her signature poached salmon, roast beef and chocolate cake logs, which she made for other events, such as the New Residents' Reception as well. In her professional life, Margot was a faculty member in the Philadelphia school district for 40 years. At a recent Board meeting, Merion Civic Association Board member Randy Blakeney fondly remembered Margot as a talented educator whom their daughter was fortunate to have as a teacher. In her many years with the Philadelphia school district, she was involved in a number of updates, revisions and renovations to school curriculum and programs. She was always looking for ways to improve the status quo. In all her roles, Margot worked diligently and tirelessly, and our community has profited invaluabley from her commitment and caring.

In addition to her husband, Joel, Margot is survived by her daughters Sarah and Judith, and her brother Michael Hoffman. Margot's warm smile, cheerful spirit, dedication and community activism will be missed by all who knew her.


Give to Your Community: Join Community Watch

At the Merion Civic Association Meeting, Matt Peskin, Executive Director, for Lower Merion Community Watch, made a plea for volunteers to join the Community Watch patrol here in Merion.

Mr. Peskin describes Community Watch as a program in which residents of Lower Merion work to "extend the eyes and ears of Lower Merion's police force." Working in conjunction with the police force, a pair of Community Watch volunteers patrol their neighborhoods on one Friday every month or so. The pairs are comprised of a driver and an observer. Each team is trained prior to patrolling the streets and while out on patrol simply watch for unusual happenings in their neighborhoods. The team radios in to police headquarters once every half hour to report whether there is any suspicious activity. Community Watch volunteers do not get involved in any situation they may witness; they simply radio information about the incident to the police. Community Watch is fun for couples or friends to do. It is also a great way to meet someone new in your neighborhood.
